ISBN : 90-5805-126-7. In the beginning of the 20th century, the Dutch East Indies (or Dutch East Indies, Java) wanted to get rid of the "Javanese language and culture" (Ramanuja). In particular, the Dutch wanted to introduce the Dutch language as well as to introduce a colonial law. In the second year of the Second World War, some educated Javanese began to publish articles in newspapers that focused on the Javanese language and culture. This motivated the Dutch to introduce a ban on the publication of Javanese language newspapers, radio, and television. It was only in 1986 that the ban was lifted, but it was only until 1990 that the ban was lifted. The ban was lifted because it was known that the Javanese themselves still supported the Javanese language and culture and even wrote the Javanese language in school. It was not only Javanese students who wrote Javanese language, but also Javanese teachers wrote Javanese language. The author believed that the banned Javanese radio was the most influential source of information for the Javanese. The Javanese radio showed the Javanese people that the Javanese language and culture were not to be banned. The banned Javanese television also showed the Javanese that the Javanese language and culture were not to be banned. Therefore, the author considers that the ban on the Javanese language and culture was lifted too late, especially after the Second World War, because the Javanese have had a long history of being the subjects of other powerful nations.
